<u>Fall Sermon Series</u> "Living in God's Economy"



On Sunday, September 7, Dr. Bias will start a sermon series titled "Living in God's Economy." Taking in consideration our mission, "Christ Church United Methodist is a welcoming community of faith, hope, and love, serving our neighbors and the world with the hands of Christ," the series will focus upon making our mission come alive in a culture of conflicting values.

As followers of Jesus, it is God's economy that informs our faith, our living, and our relationships within our Charleston community and beyond. It is God's economy that sets our priorities and helps us understand the importance of people, prayer, and finances.

The major theme for the series is "Jesus not only possessed the Holy Spirit but promised the Holy Spirit to the church and to each of us." How are we empowered to live our faith in and through Christ Church? How are we empowered to love the people we encounter in every day and ordinary ways? How do we respond to God's grace with our giving?

This fall is an excellent time to invite a friend either to worship in person or online as we learn more of what it means to be a follower of Jesus living within God's economy, and to be a transforming agent in Charleston, the Kanawha Valley, West Viriginia, and the world.

September 7 (Rally Day), our series will begin with "Priorities: First Things First" from Luke 14:25-33. To be a follower of Jesus is to live God's love in every situation and circumstance and with every relationship and acquittance.

September 14, we will focus upon "People Are Important" from Luke 15:1-10. What does it mean to say that people are important as a follower of Jesus with God's love as your priority.

September 21, the focus is upon "The Economy of Grace" from Luke 15:11-32. What does it mean, as a follower of Jesus, to respond to and extend God's grace? How does grace respond to self-righteousness?

September 28, we will explore "How Big Is the Neighborhood?" from Luke 16:19-31. How we use our resources is important. None of us would neglect a sick, starving beggar on our doorstep, but how far away must the person be before we are "no longer responsible?"

October 5 is World Communion Sunday. We will focus upon the sacredness of feeding hungry people with "More Than Enough" from Luke 9:10-17. In God's economy, feeding hungry people is as sacred as holy communion. Remembering that people are important and responding to God's grace is putting faith into action.

October 12, the focus is upon "The Grace in Gratitude" from Luke 17:11-19. In God's economy, grace and gratitude go together. Only when there is an awareness of grace can there be a response of gratitude.

October 19, we will explore "The Difficulty with Prayer" from Luke 18:1-8. The difficulty of prayer is staying focused upon God and God's priority of people and grace. Prayer demands preparation, persistence, and perseverance.

October 26, Ashley Wood will be leading us in the celebration of Children's Sabbath.

November 2 is All Saints Sunday. We will focus upon the "Understanding that God Seeks Us" from Luke 19:1-10. God comes searching for us even though we think we are searching for God.

November 9, we will focus upon "It Matters Where You Start" from John 3:1-21. John understands the God is love. His theme is "if you have seen Jesus, you have seen God." In other words, if you have seen Jesus, you have seen God's love in human form.

November 16, "It Matters Who You Love" from Matthew 28:18-20. In God's economy, relationships are important. God sent Jesus to teach us how to live before God in relationship to God and to neighbor.

November 23 is Christ the King Sunday. The focus will be upon "It Is a Matter of Power" from Luke 4:16-21. In God's economy, you have received power to communicate across the barriers of race, gender, nationality, and culture.

Why Do We Use Real Flowers in Worship?



Occasionally, the question is asked, "Why do we use real flowers in worship?" With the advancement of technology, artificial flowers look just as good as real flowers, and they last longer and cost less in the long run. So, why should the church incur the expense of having real flowers every week in worship?

The members of the Worship Arts Committee are responsible for managing the altar and font flowers, and one of the items on their monthly agenda includes a conversation about altar and font flowers. At least once a year, the committee talks about the cost of the flowers and the number of individuals who have stepped forward to sponsor flowers in memory or in honor of a loved one, or to celebrate a life event. The Worship Arts Committee is committed to the beauty of both the Centrum and the Chapel and works toward the goal of having fresh flowers every week in worship. Occasionally, the group will go through a bidding process to make sure we are getting the best flowers for the best price.

So, the reason why there are real flowers in worship is theological.

In his book, *United Methodist Altars: A Guide for the Congregation,* the late United Methodist pastor and theologian, Rev. Hoyt Hickman, spells out very clearly why churches should use real flowers. He states:

"Flowers speak of festivity, and to Christians, flowers speak specifically to the resurrection. Flowers given to the church can be an exquisite offering of praise and thanksgiving. Since flowers symbolize the resurrection, and in keeping with the principle of integrity, no type of artificial flower or plant is appropriate to the environment of worship."

Rev. Hickman goes on to say that, "If for a given service no fresh flowers are available, there are several alternatives. One is to use evergreens or mixed greenery. Another alternative is to have one or more sets of potted plants available for use when needed."

When you think about the worship spaces at Christ Church, Rev. Hickman's theological advice around flowers and greenery is exactly what the Worship Arts Committee believes is the right thing to do.

The Worship Arts Committee normally meets on the first Tuesday evening of the month from September to May, and as they regroup for the upcoming season, one of the agenda items will include a discussion about the altar and font flowers, and the costs associated with each.

To make the flower ministry successful, weekly sponsors are needed. Here are the dates that are available to sponsor flowers until the end of 2025:

- October 5, 12, 19
- November 2, 16, 23, 30
- December 7, 14, 21, 28




Fall Book Study

Through the generous sharing of your gifts, we are touching lives here at Christ Church United Methodist this past summer.

The annual summer **Music & Arts Camp** centered on the theme of creation. The composer of the week was Ludwig van Beethoven and his "Hymn to Joy." The children painted, sculpted, played Orff instruments, sang, and even made their own t-shirts. At the end of the week, the children gave a performance for their parents.

This summer, our Christ Church Youth embraced their call to serve by being the hands and feet of Christ during their **Youth Mission Trip** to Portland, Maine. While there, they partnered with Preble Street, a local food pantry that prepares an incredible 2,000 meals each day for unhoused and low-income neighbors. The Youth also teamed up with The Root Cellar, volunteering their time with the children's summer camp and assisting with the organization's ELA (English as a Second Language) class.





This year's **Vacation Bible School** hosted two sets of children. In the mornings Ashley Wood held VBS for the 40+ children aged 2-5 in The Growing Place. In the evenings with a team of church volunteers, we hosted children from our church and community ranging from preschool to 5th grade. Each group enjoyed learning music and games, hearing Bible stories and making crafts. The evening group had time to fellowship over a meal. The Mission Project for this year's VBS was to raise money for the flood buckets for the WV Annual Conference's Disaster Response Ministry. Thank you to everyone that helped make this year's Vacation Bible School a success!

The upcoming 2025-2026 season is going to be VERY exciting for the congregation of Christ Church as we celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Centrum Pipe Organ, and the installation of our Antiphonal Organ, which uses the organ pipes from the first pipe organ this congregation purchased in 1903 with funds donated by philanthropist, Andrew Carnegie.

The Worship Arts Committee, in conjunction with the Trustees, have been working during the past year to finalize all the details, including the electrical needs, as well as stain and paint colors for the project. Minister of Worship Arts/Organist, Rev. David Donathan, has been working closely with the Holtkamp Organ Company to finalize a timeline for the installation, which should begin around the first part of October and take 6-8 weeks to complete. If all goes to plan, the Centrum organ should be playable again sometime in October, but use of the antiphonal organ won't be possible until sometime in November.

Watching the installation of a pipe organ can be a once-in-a-lifetime experience. Therefore, during the installation of the organ, David plans to host an evening get-together to explain everything while it is being assembled so everyone can see, firsthand, the craftsmanship that goes into the creation of the "King of Instruments."

Playing off our bicentennial theme from 2004, "Our Future Acclaims Our Past," the theme for the organ recital series is "Renewed and Resounding; A Golden Jubilee." The word 'golden' is often used to celebrate 50th anniversaries, and in biblical history, every 50 years is a jubilee year of celebration.

In addition to the dedication of the instrument, four additional organ recitalists have been chosen to help us celebrate this historic event. Each recital will be livestreamed through our church Facebook page and our church YouTube channel. More detailed biographical information for all these recitalists will be available in the recital series concert program provided at each concert. All the concerts are free and open to the public.

"I would like to say a word of thanks to EVERYONE who has worked for at least the past 14 years to make our antiphonal organ project and this Golden Jubilee Recital Series a reality. This is a monumental event for our congregation as we bring a part of our worship arts history back into our worship life. It has been a labor of love, and I want to say thank you for everyone's hard work, dedication, and affirmations."

Brenda Portman will make her Charleston debut by giving the second recital of the Jubilee Series. Brenda is a resident of Cincinnati, Ohio, where she serves on the faculty of Xavier University as an Adjunct Professor of Organ. She also serves as the organist at Hyde Park Community United Methodist Church in Cincinnati, Ohio. Her services at Hyde Park began when our Lead Pastor, Dr. Timothy Bias, was serving Hyde Park UMC as their Lead Pastor. Brenda and Tim have known each

other for years. An award-winning organist, Brenda is quickly becoming a well-known composer of organ and chamber music, and many of her compositions are released through the Lorenz Corporation Publishing House.

Peter will be returning to Charleston to give the third recital in the Jubilee Series. Peter served here at Christ Church as the Director of Music/Organist from 1981-1991. In 1991, he took the position of Director of Music/Organist at the Third Presbyterian Church in Rochester, New York. Recently retired from the church, Peter is still the host and producer of the nationally syndicated public radio program, "With Heart and Voice." He also tours on a regular basis giving organ concerts in the United States and in Europe.

International and Internet sensation, Paul Fey, will be giving the fourth recital in the Jubilee Series, and we are fortunate that he will be touring in the United States next year. A resident of Leipzig, Germany, Paul has become an Internet sensation with his organ videos on YouTube, TikTok, Facebook, and Instagram where he celebrates almost 100,000 total subscribers. To help pay for his formal education, Paul started selling his organ compositions through his website. He is now a full-time composer and performer who travels the world promoting the art of playing the pipe organ. While he is in Charleston, he will be featuring Christ Church on his media platforms, which will give the church international exposure.

Dr. Janette Fishell will be returning to Charleston for a third time to give the final recital in the Jubilee Series. In the August 2025 magazine of the American Guild of Organists, the interviewer called her "organist royalty" because of her popularity and personality. Janette is a Professor of Music and Chair of the Organ Department at the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University, one of the largest organ schools in the country. She also travels internationally giving recitals and lectures. She is a passionate church musician, and part of her teaching career was spent at Scarritt Graduate School in Nashville, Tennessee where she served on the faculty. Our Minister of Worship Arts/Organist, David Donathan, met Janette when he was a student at Scarritt from 1985-1987 and they have been colleagues ever since.

'Jubilee Choir' Planned for Organ Dedication

To celebrate this Jubilee year for the Worship Arts Ministries, David Donathan, Minister of Worship Arts/Organist, will be creating what he is calling a 'Jubilee Choir.' This festival choir will sing for the dedication worship service and is open to anyone who would like to sing, especially past and present members of the Chancel Choir and the Wesley Choir. Extra rehearsals will be required, including a Saturday morning rehearsal for the weekend of the organ's dedication. This choir will be like a reunion or homecoming choir, so there will also be extra social events planned that weekend. The tentative date for the organ's dedication is Sunday, November 23.

New Organ Work Commissioned for the Organ Dedication in Memory of Joan and Chet Dodd



As part of the 50th anniversary celebration of the Centrum organ and the dedication and installation of the Antiphonal Organ, the family of the late Joan and Chet Dodd have been working with David Donathan, Minister of Worship Arts/Organist, to commission a new organ composition that will have its premiere as part of the organ dedication recital in November, 2025. The family has asked internationally known composer, Daniel Gawthrop (photo left, with David Donathan), to compose a three-movement organ composition of 8-10 minutes in length. Daniel moved to Charleston a few years ago and is active in the local organist guild.

Joan and Chet Dodd (photo, right) were very active in the life of the West Virginia Conference of the United Methodist Church. Chet and Joan moved to Charleston and joined Christ Church in 2002. In 2003, Joan suffered a stroke and was moved into assisted living. She passed away in 2018. Chet, along with Joan, were huge supporters of the Worship Arts Ministries of Christ Church. Chet sang bass in the Chancel Choir from 2002 until about 2015. Chet also participated in several plays and musical productions, including "The Living Last Supper, "and the Boar's Head and Yule Log Festival. Chet passed away in January of 2024. Joan and Chet's daughters, Jody Chatlain, Linda Fluharty and Kathryn Hunt, along with their families, have worked together to help commission this new organ composition, which will be dedicated to the memory of Joan and Chet and be available for purchase through Dunstan House Publishing, a branch of Subito Music, later this year.



<u>Dan Shreve Joins the Church Staff as the</u> <u>Director of Digital Marketing and Communications</u>

On Tuesday, September 2, Dan Shreve will be joining the staff of Christ Church as our new Director of Digital Marketing and Communications. 

Fall is here, and the women of Christ Church are ready with a variety of opportunities to connect, grow, and serve. Browse through the plans below and mark your calendar for the ones that inspire you!

United Women in Faith Reading Program:

The UWiF Reading Program is designed to deepen women's faith and action, with books chosen each year in five categories: Education for Mission, Spiritual Growth, Social Action, Leadership Development, and Nurturing the Community. Our library now includes books from this list along with recommendations from our board. This summer, a small group read and discussed *All That Is Secret* (Education for Mission)—a historical mystery set in 1922 Denver featuring a Black woman theologian solving crimes. Our next book, *The Book of Rosy* (Education for Mission), tells the story of a mother separated from her children at the border, which we'll discuss with the youth. All of these titles, along with past selections, are available to sign out from the library.

September 14: One Bag at a Time Sunday

The Blessing Closet, created to support our Assistance Ministry, provides personal care and household items every Tuesday. What began with just a few volunteers has grown—recipients now receive 4 items and a Bible (if requested), totaling 90–100 items given out weekly. 
